Participants will hear from keynote speakers who will be streamed live at dozens of workshop sites throughout Indiana. Each site will also host local speakers and hands-on activities. Attendees will have the chance to ask questions of local extension experts while learning business skills and best practices to improve their cut flower businesses.

The workshop costs \$65 per person, and participants should plan to attend each session. A virtual option is available for those who cannot attend a workshop site, although in-person attendance is highly encouraged to better network with other attendees and interact with speakers. have January deadlines. The FSA Marketing Assistance for Specialty Crops (MASC) application deadline is January 8, 2025. Payments are based on your specialty crop sales for 2023 or 2024, or for new producers, expected sales in 2025. See the fact sheet here. Read the official press release here.

As I sit by the window watching the snow fall, I can't help but think about what's on the minds of many high tunnel farmers right now: Can my tunnels withstand the snow? It's a concern I haven't faced in recent years, but this winter feels uncertain.

As you can imagine, ensuring the safety of your tunnels under heavy snow begins during construction. Unfortunately, if that wasn't addressed then, it's too late now to make structural changes. However, there are still practical tips and tricks that can help you protect your tunnels during heavy snowfall.
